WELCOME

Good evening everyone and welcome to the QEII Stadium for the visit of Maldon & Tiptree for this Buildbase FA Trophy fixture. We hope our guests have a safe trip back to Essex this evening

It's been five weeks since our last game, I hope you have all stayed safe over this period and not missed your football fix too much.

It's been another difficult time for us as a board as we look to balance the best interests of the club against the wider challenges being faced by the broader football community whilst at all times considering the health and safety of our players and volunteers. This came to a head last week when we were asked to vote on a proposal by the three trident leagues to pause our league fixtures pending the review of the tier system and more clarity on grants and funding available to clubs at our level.

Before the vote, the league called a meeting of clubs to debate the proposal and to ask questions to the league board, as you can imagine it was a very lively gathering. The views of the meeting were clearly split with those clubs who don't have or rely on significant income from secondary spend (bar/clubhouse) wanting to carry on and those in tier three and those more traditional "clubhouse" sides favouring the pause. It was also made clear that there is very unlikely that there will be any promotion and relegation at Steps Three and Four if all three of the leagues cannot conclude their seasons as well as it being reported that there is unlikely to be any clarity on the funding available to clubs at our level for another four or five weeks. Nick Robinson, the Isthmian League Chairman, also stated that no clubs in tier three would be forced to play games behind closed doors. Clubs at the meeting also commented on various conflicting advice from local authorities, included some clubs being threatened with fines if they were unable to control social distancing.

After the meeting of clubs we then had until midnight the following day to provide our vote. We therefore sat as a board that evening to agree our step forward. Again, it was a very lively evening with lots of positive contributions from all of the board members present, many with differing viewpoints. After much debate, we agreed to vote to support the pause, this was for a number of reasons but included the need to protect the

budgeted bar income from games in order to sustain a competitive playing budget, understand more about the likely conclusion of leagues at our level before committing additional funds on players wages, and to ensure the health and wellbeing of our players and volunteers over the festive period.

After that decision we then debated the possibility of withdrawing from the FA Trophy, given that we again cannot benefit from secondary income tonight. We again discussed this at length and decided to continue with tonight's game. We were clear that if we had been given the opportunity to pause the tournament then we would have voted for that however given that there wasn't this choice there was more positives in continuing than withdrawing.

You will have seen that one of the consequences of the latest lockdown has been the loss of Ryan Blackman and Lyle Della-Verde to Welling United. Both players asked us to facilitate them moving to Welling on a dual registration at the start of the lockdown in order that they could continue to earn income during these tough times. As neither player was on contract, there was nothing we could do to stop them registering for another side and therefore we took the approach to try and manage the situation so that they stayed registered with us too. Unfortunately for us, both players performed very well during their spell at the higher level and were offered deals at Welling that we weren't able to compete with. I've been public in my disappointment in how this was handled by Welling but, ultimately, as other clubs at our level are finding out, there is very little we can do to protect ourselves other than to have all our players on contract which simply wouldn't be feasible. Full credit to Andy and his team for keeping the rest of the squad engaged during the most recent enforced lay-off and for the players for keeping themselves in shape despite the lack of formal training sessions. We all hope that this hard work is rewarded with a big performance tonight. Enjoy the game.

FROM THE BENCH ANDY LEESE

Welcome to Maldon & Tiptree for this FA Trophy 1st Round game. They have had another good start to the season, with another impressive FA cup run, and we will have to be on our game tonight. Hopefully, we can continue with a run in the FA Trophy as we did last year.

The national lockdown put an end to matters on the pitch for us all back in November. We ended with a win against Brightlingsea but we made hard work of it. We find ourselves in a decent position in the League, but again we have no League football in sight until at least January would be my guess. I understand the issues around us not continuing to play, but it is frustrating with the stop start nature of the situation. All we can do is keep in shape, continue to train and be ready at short notice to recommence.

The squad has changed again this week as we lost players who went out with good intentions to play temporarily at Step 2. The Chairman has made our position very clear on what happened as we eventually lost two key players. Not everyone involved in the situation was as forthcoming or honest in their intentions, and I see Welling's view of matters bears scant resemblance to the facts. We risk losing more players to various levels if the league campaign does not recommence soon. It is not a scenario we ever envisaged happening but, frankly, there is very little we can do about it if players want to play.

The squad will be kept under constant review as always, and we may well have a new face on show tonight as we look to strengthen the attacking area of the pitch. Without Shaun Okojie, we remain light in forward areas.

On the plus side some injuries have cleared up with Scott Thomas and Lewis Taaffe both back in action last weekend at Hayes in a behind-closed-doors friendly.



As ever your support for the team will be appreciated again in this very unusual season whenever we play. Let's make it a memorable night together. The club continues to be a great story in the midst of the pandemic over these last few months. Let's continue to work together this season as best we can to make that story even better.



Town were in good form going into this one and, after Barking keeper Tony Tucker had saved well from Rudi Hall in a one-on-one situation, Bryan Hammatt opened the scoring on 16 minutes from close range after a mix-up in the visitors' defence. Andy Hall did well to keep out a misplaced defensive header from Kevin Stephens before the referee waved away penalty appeals after Trevor Paul went down in the box. Niall Ritchie shot wide against one of his former clubs, but Paul put the hosts into a good position seconds before the break when Hall crossed for him to pirouette and volley into the roof of the net.

After the break, Town put together some easy-on-the-eye flowing moves. Hammatt and Ritchie were off target, before the latter chipped Tucker only to see the bounce take the ball beyond the far upright. Paul and Steve Velandia both had low shots the wrong side of the post from a Town perspective and Hammatt missed a very convertible chance, but it was well and truly all over for Barking when Joel Palmer was dismissed for a second yellow card and Rudi Hall then capped a fine individual display by unleashing a low drive to seal the points with a few minutes left.

Town, incredibly, came from two down with five minutes remaining to earn a valuable three points at Cricklefields.

The first chance for the visitors arrived on 15 minutes when Leon Osei showed some skill down the left, controlling the ball on the muddy surface and skidding the ball across the goalmouth where Walid Matata, stretching, was unlucky not to get his toe onto the ball. It was then Adam Wallace's turn to put in a cross, for the advancing Dan Forward to shoot against an upright. And it was Forward again who beat keeper Jason Willis only to see the ball hit the inside of the post and roll along the goal-line.

Bottom-of-the-table Forest were unable to fashion any genuine openings during the first 45 minutes, with only a handful of half-chances to recall, the best of which was probably when Danny Francis received the ball on the edge of the box only for Rob Blackburne to dive at his feet before he could get a shot in.

After the break, Marquin Smith had a shot blocked by Craig McKay and Ashley Taylor-Forbes' effort was comfortably saved by Blackburne. Jon Stevenson was somewhat harshly shown a straight red card for a "competitive" challenge on Jamie Hayward, and Forest made it 1-0 shortly afterwards when substitute Ade Cole got in behind Lee Protheroe and put in a cross-cum-shot to the far post which looped over Blackburne.

It was 2-0 when McKay was outmuscled by Brian Okwere and Francis subsequently slotted the ball under the diving Blackburne. Town sub Liam Hope headed a Protheroe cross just wide but, with four minutes to go, he netted a penalty after Adam Wallace had been brought down by Willis. Matata then converted from close range after Protheroe had launched a free kick into the home box and it had been nodded on by Mark Kirby. Willis could only palm the ball into the path of the advancing striker. Then, unbelievably, it was 2-3 in the 90th minute when some great work by Wallace provided an opening for Matata to place the ball past the advancing Willis.


On a well-grassed pitch, Town took the lead on 15 minutes when Samir Bihmoutine played a good through ball which Joe Stevens converted from six yards. A couple of minutes later, Nathan McDonald sliced a clearance following a back pass, but he was relieved when Jake Clowsley, having latched onto the loose ball, was just off target. McDonald was in action soon afterwards, catching a high ball above the same player, and then Bobby Devyne tested Daniel Beeson in the home goal.

After Ricky Griggs's lob had dropped onto the roof of the Town net, Tyler Campbell scored a fine second goal after 35 minutes following a neat one-two with Corey Whitely outside the penalty area in a central position. The prominent Clowsley then had the ball in the Town net but from an offside position and Tayshan Hayden-Smith had a chip saved by Beeson.

Regent pulled a goal back five minutes into the second half when Matt Cripps netted inside a crowded penalty box, and a good effort from Russell Malton fizzed past McDonald's left-hand post as the Rs upped the tempo approaching the hour mark. Lamell Howell's effort was high soon afterwards, and Keiron Baker had another attempt saved by McDonald. In the 72nd minute, Bihmoutine had a good effort just over, and then, following a series of home corners, McDonald made a double-save from Clowsley and Howell to preserve Town's passage.

LAST TIME WE MET

ENFIELD TOWN 4 MALDON & TIPTREE 3

Enfield Town became the first team to beat Maldon & Tiptree in anything other than a penalty shoot-out in 2019-20; the Jammers' unbeaten run coming to an end in a see-saw game which saw Town advance into the First Round Proper of the FA Trophy for the first time.

Barely a minute had passed before the deadlock was broken. Town's leading scorer Mo Faal cut in from the left and fired past Ben McNamara into the top corner. Maldon responded well, however, and Jorome Slew forced two good saves from Nathan McDonald – the first a curler pushed away and the second a shot tipped over the bar to keep the hosts' early lead intact.

But pressure on the Town goal was eventually rewarded, with Danny Parish slotting past McDonald to give the Jammers a deserved equaliser on 20 minutes, in what was already an extremely open and entertaining cup tie.

Faal continued to cause the Maldon back line problems and he found himself in a similar position to where he had scored earlier. But, after doing well to get past Kojo Awotwi, this time he could only blast over. The visitors then went straight back down to the opposite end and Parish's cross-shot just evaded Slew at the back post.

In a game you couldn't take your eyes off, Faal was denied by a one-on-one save by McNamara. But, from the subsequent corner on 40 minutes, the hosts' lead was restored when the ball fell at the feet of captain Marc Weatherstone in the box, and his deflected left foot effort found the bottom corner despite the many bodies in his way.

Just when Town thought they would go into the interval in the lead, they were pegged back once again. After the home side had conceded possession high up the field, Slew broke away in one of the many Maldon counter attacks of the afternoon and was brought down by McDonald near the touchline. Referee Abigail Byrne pointed to the spot, allowing Parish to fire home his and his side's second via McDonald's fingertips.

The second period started just like the first had ended; entertaining football from both sides who were both going for broke to book a spot in the next round. The first chance of the half fell to Billy Bricknell, whose free kick was well saved by McNamara. Maldon then found themselves on the counter again, this time Slew blazing over after seemingly having plenty of time to pick his spot.

Town didn't learn from this and were hit on the counter yet again after 58 minutes. Slew turned provider and crossed into the danger area for Charlee Hughes, finding himself all alone in the middle, and he slotted under McDonald to give the Jammers the lead for the first time in the tie.


Town responded well and, after Faal had again been denied by McNamara, the tie was turned on its head. Bricknell, who had been frustrated by tight marking for most of the afternoon, fired in a free kick through the visitors' defensive wall and in off the post to make it 3-3 and set up a grandstand finish.

Then, fifteen minutes from time, the ball was played up to the hard-working Bricknell. Under pressure from several closing Maldon players, he chested it down on the edge of the box and rifled a sublime half-volley over the flailing McNamara and in off the crossbar. It was a fitting end to an exciting cup tie.

FINLAND INTERESTED IN TOWN'S STORY

We had a visit before Lockdown2 from Urheilulehti – a popular weekly Finnish sports magazine with a circulation of over 30,000 – which is the second oldest sports journal in the world (after the Italian La Gazzetta Dello Sport)

Urheilulehti was founded by Ivar Wilsman in January 1898, and is a weekly publication, with its headquarters in Helsinki. Below is a translated extract from an article that focused on the Town v Leatherhead match, words courtesy of Lari Seppinen and photos courtesy of Peter van den Berg – pivdphoto.com

English football offers two completely different worlds. The dominant force is the Premier League – with its clubs Liverpool and Manchester United pushing for “project big picture” [at the time of writing] – who have been playing behind closed doors for many weeks, and the proposed changes led by John W. Henry and Joel Glazer, if accepted, would bring about radical changes in English football.

At the highest level, in practice, it would concentrate an additional focus onto the so-called big six – Arsenal, Chelsea, Liverpool, Manchester City, Manchester United and Tottenham Hotspur. The rich would then get richer and the gap to the next level would grow still further.

The remaining parts of the picture provide a more realistic view of UK football, including grassroots. These significant communities, where billions do not flow in to and out of bank accounts and whose plans will be able to progress sustainably without necessarily including aspirations other than to break even each season.

An example of the many hundreds of clubs in this world is Enfield Town, in North London and playing in the seventh tier of English football. Just over an hour's drive away is Leatherhead, in Surrey. Our reporters watched the Enfield Town v Leatherhead Isthmian League Premier Division match on Saturday 10th October.

The coronavirus in England has led to tiers one to six (“elite” level) playing behind closed doors but, from the seventh level downwards, clubs are permitted to allow people in to limited-capacity games. Enfield Town's 2,500

capacity Queen Elizabeth Stadium will strictly limit the attendance against Leatherhead to 350 pairs of eyes although, in theory, as many as 600 could be allowed in.

Ram Ismail, one of the directors of the fan-owned club, is helping behind the counter at the club shop: “We limited this afternoon to 350 spectators because it's a figure the board have decided is one with which we can operate effectively and control the event with all the necessary Covid-19 precautions in place. But, incrementally, I see no reason why eventually we couldn't take in up to 600 in the light of experience”.

The former Enfield Football Club ceased operations in the first decade of the millennium due to financial hardship. Before that, the then Chairman Tony Lazarou had sold the club's Southbury Road stadium – and home of 63 years – in 1999. Fans founded Enfield Town FC in 2001 in order to ensure that matches could continue in the area at a competitive level. In November 2011, the new club moved to its current stadium, having achieved two promotions since foundation, and local fans are very proud of what has been achieved. Ismail is disappointed that Step 3 of the pyramid isn't protected as much financially as higher levels of the game have been: “I hope we get greater recognition from the authorities, not least as clubs in the Premier League have many millions of pounds when, at our level, supporters volunteer their services for nothing. We can only hope that our hard-work on various activities may not be necessarily remunerated directly, but in some way can be acknowledged and supported financially.”

At Step 3 the authorities currently allow in up to 15 percent of ground capacity. In other countries such as Japan clubs are allowed to take in up to 30 percent. Ismail continues “In some respects I feel sympathy for those non-league clubs who do play at a higher level. Although it has been in many ways disappointing that we haven't been able to get promoted in recent seasons, now we can fully

appreciate that a consequence of it not happening is that we are all able to gather safely here today”.

Enfield Town, like other non-league clubs, have been existing for over six months now without regular income. The 2019-20 season ended in March and the new one will start in September. Paul Reed has been the Chairman of the club since 2015. He was involved in setting up and establishing Enfield Town and remembers the glory days of the old club when, among other successes, the team celebrated victory in the FA Trophy in 1988.

Reed's view is that, without a strong, local fan base and the club's positive ownership culture, it would not have survived the current calendar year. “A half-year break with no regular income. It has been a really challenging time, to say the least, to maintain at least some activities and keep paying the ever-accumulating bills” he says, speaking in the club's currently closed Butler's Bar. “Fans' significant donations have helped us through such a barren time”.



Although Reed is Chairman, the majority of the club's decisions are made collectively, with the goodwill of the community uppermost in mind. Fan ownership has its pros and cons, but there are currently over 200 paid-up members of the Enfield Town FC Supporters Society. “In many ways, it works well overall” continues Reed. “Everyone is in the same boat and pulling together with a common passion. At the same time, it is challenging. But the current operating model is, above all, due to a bitter lesson learned from the demise of the old Enfield FC. It's hard to get things done quickly, but that's the way the club is set up. Importantly, with a 99 year lease on the stadium there is no opportunity for any one person to sell the ground, for example”.

“Rising higher in the pyramid would probably require the infrastructure to be expanded and modified. In our current situation we have to live day-to-day, but all actions taken are very much with the future in mind. We have developed a football and study academy in partnership with a local provider, which is a big step forward for the club and for football in the whole area” Reed says.

Enfield's strength is that it doesn't reach for the moon but accepts its role in the football food chain as a relatively small but locally significant club. Supporter David Wisbey believes that the commitment of the supporters is vital for the survival of non-league clubs and that, during the pandemic, getting to a game is mentally important for many locals. Match day routines are in evidence, with social distancing and masks worn, with the prospect of some normality in the middle of everything so abnormal.

“Many people are used to going out on a Saturday with a group of friends to meet up in a pub or in the club's bar to chat about the game and have repeated this routine for years. Everyone wants their teams to play well of course, but football has a wider role as a social event” says Wisbey.

Some fans of larger teams that do not currently allow spectators are looking for familiar matchday routines from non-league games. At Enfield Town, some of the people I talk to reveal themselves to be supporters of big clubs – one Arsenal, another Manchester United and a third Chelsea.

In many ways, playing matches at the top with empty stadiums will help clubs lower down. “Corona immigrant fans”, as the guests might be called, with the diversion of their attention to lower levels. One example of that is Justin Phillips, who is an Arsenal fan living in Leatherhead and has been supporting the local community club for the past five years. Founded in 1907 ‘The Tanners’ are in no hurry to escape life at non-league level. An average of over 400 fans have attended Leatherhead's home games during the early part of the 2020-21 campaign.

For Leatherhead, as with many others, the club will not survive without the revenue brought in by spectators says Phillips. “With the economic position not very stable, the longer we go on with such an exceptional situation everyone is operating under the spectre of bankruptcy. Fortunately, with safety measures and a limited number of fans allowed in, we've got the job done” Phillips continues.

Another Leatherhead supporter, Grace Douch, feels that matches with supporters is an important factor for the players as well. “When the games came to a halt in March, it made life difficult for many players. But now they have got a controlled routine back into their lives, after the necessity for everyone to train on their own for a spell.” Douch suggests.

At non-league level the 2020-21 season is as busy, if not more so, than in the top echelons of the game. With a compressed campaign due to the pandemic, there are two games most weeks – Tuesdays or Wednesdays and Saturdays.

As the match kicks off, songs echo from both sets of supporters. The entrance and the surround have been strewn with yellow and black signs to indicate safe social distancing boundaries. But that does not dampen the atmosphere. The referee gets to hear a reaction to his decisions throughout, and on the field it is very competitive. But there is a smile in on everyone's faces, although the sunshine turns to rain for the last five minutes. Town win 1-0 and stay in touch with the play-off positions.

Leatherhead are currently tenth in the 22-team division. But league tables are secondary, especially in the current situation. The most important thing, for many at least, is to drink a pint of beer, chat with acquaintances and sing throughout the 90 minutes.

Within the “elite” classification, clubs are battling with the government over restrictions and money. No one can tell when the doors to stadiums will open again fully at that level. At the same time, the gap between “elite” and “non elite” threatens the entirety of English football culture.

The stories of Enfield Town and Leatherhead serve as reminders of the fact that the true greatness of sporting culture does not arise from profit, but from how smaller clubs and their communities contribute with their unsung, but significant, work.

TOWN LADIES

The ladies side have made progress in the Vitality Women's FA Cup in their 35th Anniversary year

The Ladies club was originally founded in 1985 as Merryhills Midgets, a name taken from the primary school that founder members attended writes Chris Devine. The original idea for the club came about when some girls showed an interest in playing football and their parents decided to help them achieve their wish. We only competed in 5-a-side tournaments in the early years but continued to grow as more players joined.

The Club has undergone a couple of name changes throughout the years and in 2003 we formed official links with Enfield Town FC (Men's), which was set up by the supporters of the now defunct Enfield FC, leading us to be called Enfield Town Ladies FC. The Ladies Section remains one of the largest and longest established girls and women's football clubs in the South East.

The philosophy of the Ladies Section is "Football for All" so all players can enjoy playing competitive football without the pressure of having to win games. The aspiration is to provide quality training, development and opportunities for the benefit of the individual, the teams and the football club as a whole and to provide a model pathway for learning and development of youth players such that the opportunity to play for the First Team at Senior Level exists.

We are also a "sister club" of Arsenal Women whereby the Club's coaches have access to their training plans and can request meetings with their coaches. There are also a number of opportunities for girls to be mascots, ball girls and flag bearers at Arsenal Women's home matches.

We are always looking to run as many teams as there are members for, allowing "Football for All". Interested parties are invited to attend open training sessions prior to signing. We currently have around 150 players signed to the club. The ambition is to try and compete at youth level at each age group from u9 to U18s whilst offering a pathway to senior football from aged 16.

All teams play in competitive leagues, with the exception of teams aged under 10 years, who play friendly matches at a central venue. All competitive home games take place at Donkey Lane on Saturday mornings (U18s and below) and on Sunday afternoons (Thirds, Reserves and Firsts).

The first team compete in the FA Women's National League and play their games at the Queen Elizabeth II Stadium which is of course shared with Town Men's Teams. The thirds and reserves play in the Greater London Women's League.

At the weekend, the first team progressed into the first round proper of the Women's FA Cup with a 2-1 win at Luton Town Ladies. The Hatters opened scoring after twelve minutes from the penalty spot through Erica Byron after a shot from Jess McKay had been handled, but Town equalised in the 44th minute after some good interplay between Courtney Cook and goalscorer Beau Parker.

Enfield scored what turned out to be winner just beyond the hour mark, former Crystal Palace player Parker again getting on the scoresheet when she converted a fine cross by Mollie Kmita. The Ladies will travel to face the winners of Kent Football United and AFC Wimbledon. Meanwhile, the reserves trounced Hampton & Richmond Borough 14-1 and the 3rds won 1-0 at Tower Hamlets.



TRIDENT LEAGUES STATEMENT AND COVID-19 PRECAUTIONS

A statement was issued by the Isthmian, Northern Premier and Southern Football Leagues on 4th December, following the new tiers announced by the government. The Trident Leagues had asked clubs to respond to a proposition that a pause in league fixtures be continued with regular reviews in light of any changes to the national tiers and/or grants becoming available.

There were 224 Clubs voting across the three leagues and, of these, 172 agreed with the proposition to continue a pause in fixtures. The "Agree" vote was 76% overall and it has therefore been agreed that the three Trident Leagues will not sanction fixtures at this time. It is intended that this situation is kept under review in line with Government reviews on the tier allocations and restrictions. Accordingly, the next review is set for 16th December and then 30th December. It is the hope of all Trident Leagues that a date in January can be set for a return to fixtures but this will not be until there is a change in the tiers and/or some progress in the funding of the clubs at this level.

If no progress is made by the Government on the tiers at either of the two December review points, it is the intention of the Alliance Committee to circulate those concerned a survey to gather the views of clubs as how best to finish the season. Options include an alternative format competition and extending the season - possibly into June 2021. However, the implications of all such proposals will involve the cost of players contracts and the ability of some clubs to continue playing because of other issues of grounds and the need to prepare grass pitches for the following season.

The Government has allocated £14m to Sport England to fund National Leagues System Steps 3-6, but this is heavily weighted in favour of loans, not grants. The FA is working tirelessly with DCMS and Sport England to have the funding presented as grants. The Trident Leagues are mindful of the needs of all clubs and are striving to find a solution which is fair to all. Enfield Town FC will keep supporters in touch with any developments as quickly as possible, primarily through the club website and social media. Any breaking news will be relayed via tannoy announcements.

In staging this evening's match, the club will continue to take steps to ensure that lessons are learned and applied from previous fixtures. MALDON & TIPTREE

In the summer of 2010, Maldon Town & Tiptree United amalgamated to form Maldon & Tiptree FC under the ownership of Ed Garty. As a consequence of the amalgamation, Tiptree United withdrew from the Essex Senior League and Maldon & Tiptree took the place of Maldon Town in the Isthmian League Division One North.

Following the retirement of Colin Wallington, assistant managers Brad King and Glen Knight were appointed as joint managers. The 2010-11 campaign saw a respectable 8th place finish for the new club but during the following November King and Knight were relieved of their duties and former Charlton Athletic striker Mike Flanagan was appointed temporarily, steering the club to a mid-table finish.

At the start of 2012-13 ex-Redbridge boss Terry Spillane was appointed as manager in Flanagan's place. After an impressive unbeaten run at the start of the season, the club were only pipped to the championship by a very strong Grays Athletic outfit, and they had to settle for a place in the play-offs. Disappointment came in the final, however. After dispatching Aveley 3-1 in the semis, they drew 2-2 with Thamesmead Town, again at home, who went on to clinch promotion 4-1 on penalties.

2013-14 ended with the club in 9th position, but a poor start to the 2014-15 season led to a parting of the ways with Spillane, with Alan Kimble coming in, but fortunes did not improve and the side finished 19th.

Soon afterwards, the club linked up with Colchester United to form close ties and this resulted in ex-Ipswich Town midfielder David Wright being appointed in the hotseat. But he was soon appointed as Colchester's assistant manager so, after caretaker Liam Bailey had taken charge of the side, former Leiston boss Steve Ball was appointed and he did well with the team ending up in 7th position. Again, the club needed to recast their net when Ball became assistant manager at Colchester and former Manchester City man Kevin Horlock arrived, and his squad managed to reach the play-offs (7th), beating Haringey Borough 5-4 before losing to Thurrock by a single goal, both matches at Park Drive.

After a subsequent 7th place finish, Horlock departed to be replaced by former Premier League defender Wayne Brown. In Brown's first season in charge (2018-19), the Jammers finished as runners-up, but again promotion proved elusive with a 1-0 home success against Coggeshall being followed by a 2-2 draw at the same venue against Heybridge Swifts but a 0-2 defeat on penalties.

The 2019-20 season was one to remember for the club, reaching the first round of the FA Cup for the first time, beating Leyton Orient 2-1 away and, in the 2nd round, only being edged out 0-1 at home to Newport County in front of a record attendance of 1,876. However, the season will also be remembered for it being curtailed in the wake of the coronavirus pandemic with the Jammers 13 points clear at the top of the table.

Following the disappointing end to last term, Wayne Brown has remained in charge and, despite a significant turnover of players, Maldon have started 2020-21 impressively, only losing 0-1 at home to Morecambe in the FA Cup first round, well-placed in the table and hot favourites for promotion.

BEN McNAMARA (Goalkeeper)
Australian-born Ben is now in his third season at Park Drive. He had spells at clubs including Braintree Town, Colchester United, Dagenham & Redbridge, Harlow Town and Northampton Town prior to signing for the Jammers, and is currently the club's vice-captain. He was selected in the Emirates FA Cup Team of the Round following his performance in the team's narrow 0-1 defeat at home to Morecambe.

JAMES CONWAY (Goalkeeper)
Ben McNamara's deputy, teenager James has progressed from college football and Maldon & Tiptree Under 17s into the first team squad. He has been on the bench on a number of occasions this term.

NIRAN BUTLER (Defender)
Niran joined Staines Town from Flackwell Heath in June 2019, where he had been since leaving Barnet's youth set-up. Niran appeared fifteen times for Staines in the 2019/20 season before it was cut short due to the Coronavirus pandemic.

MAKHOSINI KHANYE (Defender)
Known as Ryan, he joined the club from Faversham Town in September. Primarily a left back, he started out at Brentford before spending time at Bristol City, Erith & Belvedere, Greenwich Borough, Staines Town and Whitehawk. He made his Jammers' debut in a 1-0 FA Cup success at Hertford Town.

BILLY CRACKNELL (Defender)
Billy, 18, has had experience with Colchester United and is on loan from the League Two outfit. He began his second spell at Maldon in a 1-1 draw at Soham Town Rangers and then got on the scoresheet in a 3-0 success at Haverhill Rovers in the FA Cup in September. He can operate at full-back or in the centre.

MARTYN STOKES (Defender)
Martyn moved to the Wallace Binder Ground from Bowers & Pitsea during the 2019-20 season, making his debut at Enfield Town in a 3-4 FA Trophy defeat in the November. He has gained experience of Isthmian League Division One North promotions with both Brentwood and Bowers and is captain for 2020-21.

RHAMAR GARRETT-DOUGLAS (Defender)
Having been a scholar at Barnet, where he was a regular in their U18 side, 18 year-old Rhamar has had spells at Bishops Stortford and Hullbridge Sports. He made his Jammers debut in a 1-0 FA Cup win at Hertford Town in September.

KRAIG NOEL-MCLEOD (Defender)
