



Welcome to Folkestone Invicta FC for the opening day of the new league season

They were a contender all through last season and were unfortunate to tail off in the last few weeks. Neil Cugley knows how to build winning teams and it looks like he has done that again this summer. Match Report: Martin Bentley

Enfield Town's final pre-season friendly resulted in a low-key 2-0 victory over a well-organised Berkhamsted side.

The stifling heat resulted in a slow-paced game that will undoubtedly bear little resemblance to this afternoon's opening league fixture against Folkestone, although Town's overall performance was encouragingly efficient.

Neither side succeeded in troubling the goalkeepers in the opening half hour, although Lewis Taaffe shot narrowly over, and Marcus Wyllie missed inexplicably from five yards after being set up by Ryan Kirwan.

The first on-target efforts came from the visitors, both being dealt with well by Nathan McDonald, but Town got their noses in front after 41 minutes, with Lyle Della-Verde curling a trademark sublime free-kick past visiting keeper Craig Hill.

The second half continued in similar soporific vein, not helped by the inevitable procession of substitutions. Taaffe had a shot well saved after being set up by Wyllie, and Della-Verde shot narrowly over before Town scored a second after 79 minutes. Once again, the assist came from the industrious Wyllie; his pass being converted by a trialist from close range.

FOLKESTONE INVICTA

Folkestone Invicta Football Club was formed in 1936 and originally plied its trade in the East Kent Amateur League.

They went on to join the Eastern Section of the Kent County League, winning Division One in 1969–70 and the Premier Division in 1978–79. Following the demise of the town's main football club, Folkestone F.C, who had enjoyed a long history in the Southern League, Invicta took over use of the Cheriton Road ground in early 1991. Under manager Gary Staniforth, Invicta joined the Kent League and completed the Division Two league and cup double during the 1991–92 season, also winning the Kent Intermediate Shield that season. Invicta achieved senior status and joined Division One of the Kent League, making steady progress in its first two seasons at this level under club stalwart Staniforth.

The 1996–97 season saw a club record 2,332 in attendance as the club played hosts to West Ham United in a benefit game following freak floods in the town. Harry Redknapp brought down a strong Irons side that won 6–0 and included Portuguese World Cup star Paolo Futre, and a young Frank Lampard. The arrival of manager Neil Cugley from Ashford Town during the summer of 1997 would provide the catalyst for the return of Southern League football to the town. After finishing as runners-up in Division One of the Kent League in 97–98, they earned promotion to the Southern Division of the Southern League, before being transferred to the Eastern Division for the 1999–2000 season, going on to finish as runners-up and earning another promotion – this time to the Premier Division. Invicta would spend three seasons there before relegation back to the Eastern Division in 2002–03. Fifth place the following season was enough

for an immediate promotion due to the creation of the Conference North and South, though the club were transferred across to the Isthmian League, joining its Premier Division.

In 2005–06 Invicta reached the first round of the FA Cup for the first time, losing 2–1 at then-League Two side Chester City. Four seasons in the Isthmian League Premier Division would end in relegation to Division One South at the end of the 08–09 season. They would go into administration in 2009–10, finishing as runners-up in Division One South and missing out on the title after having ten points deducted. Nevertheless, they qualified for the promotion play-offs and defeated Godalming Town 2–1 in the final, earning promotion back to the Premier Division. The next season would see the club relegated straight back to Division One South, finishing bottom.

Invicta would finish in the top five over the next four seasons, yet they would lose in all four play-offs; in 2011–12 to Dulwich Hamlet, in 12–13 at the same stage to Maidstone United, in the 13–14 final on penalties to Leatherhead, and to Merstham in 14–15. They would finally win the Division One South title in 2015–16 to return to the Premier Division. Recent years have seen Invicta continue to push towards promotion to the National League, as well as solid representation in FA competition, and last season they matched fifth-tier Eastleigh across 210 minutes of FA Cup football, losing narrowly in extra time of their replay at the Build Kent Stadium. Having made some shrewd additions over the summer, they will be aiming to build upon some impressive displays last season and go at least one better than last term's sixth-place finish.

BAILEY VOSE (Goalkeeper):

Invicta's new man between the sticks this season is 6ft 4" custodian Bailey Vose, who most recently turned out for Cray Wanderers. The 24-year-old came through the academy system at Brighton & Hove Albion; gaining loan experience at Concord Rangers, Eastbourne Borough, and Welling United while contracted to the Seagulls. In 2018 he signed for Colchester United and whilst there had a six-month loan spell with Dartford. He has also represented Margate and Billericay Town in recent seasons, the latter awarding him their Player of the Month award for August & September last year.

CONNOR COLLINS (Goalkeeper):

Goalie Connor recently turned 19 and made the step from Invicta's youth team into the first team squad last season, earning his senior starting debut in May's Kent Senior Cup Final against Dartford. He played – and kept a clean sheet – against Folkestone in pre-season, as opponents Dover hadn't brought a substitute keeper with them, with Collins filling in for 75 minutes in place of the Whites' injured stopper.

CALLUM DAVIES (Defender):

Skipper Callum initially joined on loan from Maidstone United during August 2016 and has now made over 150 appearances for Invicta. He began his career at Gillingham, for whom he began as a trainee, captained the youth team, progressed to the reserves and made 29 first team appearances between 2010-15. He won a League Division Two title medal under Martin Allen in 2013 but injury restricted his progress. During that time, he also had loan spells at Lewes, Thurrock, Dover Athletic, Bromley and Eastleigh before joining Maidstone.

IAN GAYLE (Defender):

Cousin of West Indies T20 legend Chris Gayle, central defender Ian signed on at Cheriton Road during the off-season from Eastbourne Borough. He had been with Cray Valley PM on a dual registration deal last year, and at 29 has had plenty of experience around non-league; with Dagenham & Redbridge, Wealdstone, Woking and Braintree Town among his former employers.

LUCA BORRELLO (Defender):

Invicta youth team captain Luca made his senior debut as a substitute in their 3-2 win here at the QEII Stadium last season. The 18-year-old signed forms to join the first-team squad this season.

MATT NEWMAN (Defender):

Matt rejoined Folkestone from Hythe Town during August 2017 and impressed as a centre-back having played predominantly in midfield during his first spell with the club. He'd originally joined the club during March 2013 from Chatham Town, playing his part during the 2015-16 championship-winning side before joining Hythe Town early in the 2017-18 season. Named Players' Player of the Year for 2018-19, his other previous clubs include Erith & Belvedere, Ashford Town, Tunbridge Wells and Tonbridge Angels.

JOSH VINCENT (Defender):

Currently Folkestone Invicta's longest-serving player, Josh was rewarded with a testimonial season for 2017-18, having first stepped up into the first team squad during 2008-09, when he was named Young Player of the Year. A goalscoring right-back integral during Invicta's 2009-10 and 2015-16 promotion campaigns, he has now made over 500 appearances for the club.

NATHAN GREEN (Defender):

Experienced left-back Nathan joins fellow new recruit Ian Gayle in joining Invicta this summer from Cray Valley PM, where he was named in the Isthmian South-East Managers' Team of the Season. He started out at Croydon Athletic, and followed manager Tim O'Shea to then-National South side Lewes in 2010 before going on to represent Bromley, Billericay Town – who he helped to the Isthmian Premier Division title – Tonbridge Angels, Dagenham & Redbridge, and Welling United among others.

RONNIE DOLAN (Midfielder):

Midfielder Ronnie is back in the side having had spells out with injury, and has been with Folkestone for almost eight years now, scoring with his first touch for the club as a substitute at home to Corinthian-Casuals in November 2014. He joined the club from Hastings United and has also had spells at Ashford Town, Ashford United, Hythe Town and Welling United.

ROB DOLAN (Midfielder):

A former Ashford United youngster, Rob is brother of fellow Invicta midfielder Ronnie Dolan. The attacking midfielder has featured for the Stripes throughout pre-season, having also represented Canterbury City, Lydd Town, Kennington, and K Sports.

SCOTT HEARD (Midfielder):

Scott re-joined the club from Dagenham & Redbridge during the summer of 2017 after signing for the Daggers in October 2016. He originally joined Invicta

from Whitstable Town, through whose youth system he progressed, going on to make over 200 appearances having first started out as a youngster at Canterbury. An exciting player who covers a lot of ground, he scored twice for Invicta in 3-1 league win at the QEII back in November 2019.

JAMES ROGERS (Midfielder):

Left-sided midfielder James, 37, re-joined Folkestone for a third spell in the summer from neighbours Hythe Town, whom he had guided to safety from relegation as player-manager. 'Rogo' only made seven appearances during his last couple of stints for the club, but is vastly experienced at this level, having also worn the shirts of Maidstone United and Margate since his senior debut for Dover Athletic in 2003.

MICHEAL EVERITT (Midfielder)

Folkestone's record appearance holder, having represented them on over 700 occasions, Micheal was appointed a player-coach during the summer of 2017. He came through the successful youth system at Invicta, where he captained the side that played away to Millwall youths in the Second Round of the FA Youth Cup in 1999-2000. He was rewarded with a testimonial at the club during 2008. Voted Folkestone's Supporters' Player of the Year for 2009-10 - when he led Invicta to promotion from the Isthmian League Division One South and was ever present in all competitions - and again in 2018-19, he scored the opener when the sides last met here in December 2021.

IAN DRAYCOTT (Midfielder):

Ian joined the club from Leatherhead during the summer of 2014, since when he has become something of an Invicta legend. He broke James Dryden's record of 141 senior goals for the club when he scored from the penalty spot at home to Potters Bar Town back in September, and won the Isthmian League Division One South Golden Boot in the promotion season of 2015-16 with a remarkable 40 league goals. Now playing a slightly more withdrawn role from his familiar forward berth, Folkestone held a testimonial match for him against Maidstone United during pre-season.

KADELL DANIEL (Forward):

Lambeth-born Kadell started out in Crystal Palace's academy, moving on to Charlton and gaining his first senior experience with Hayes & Yeading and Torquay United. A full Guyana international with 13 caps and 3 goals, the left-sided winger's CV also includes Woking, Leatherhead, Dover Athletic, and Margate.

LENNY ATHERTON (Forward):

Exciting young striker Lenny became the first member of Invicta's Academy side to appear for the first team after coming on as a substitute in a 5-0 home win over Haringey Borough last season. His wonder-strike against Merstham earned him FIFC's Goal of the Month award for December 2021.

IBRAHIM OLUTADE (Forward):

Centre-forward Ibrahim is a summer arrival at Folkestone, making the switch across the county from Tonbridge Angels. The 23-year-old began his senior career with Hanwell Town, joining Leatherhead after an impressive series of performances and scoring 29 in 55 appearances with the Tanners. Following a stint with Maidstone United, he moved to Kent neighbours Tonbridge in 2021, scoring six times - including an FA Cup Winner against Torquay United of the National League.

IRA JACKSON (Forward):

Nippy forward Ira, 25, is no stranger to Invicta, and the fans' favourite has recently re-signed for the club upon his release from Wealdstone. His previous goalscoring exploits at Cheriton Road, netting 31 in 51 games, earned him a move to EFL side Grimsby Town, where he spent one season, scoring the winning penalty in an EFL Trophy tie against Harrogate. His last goal for the Stripes came in a 1-1 draw against Enfield Town, so things may well come full circle should he find the net this afternoon.

ADE YUSUFF (Forward):

Striker Ade re-joined the club in April 2021 having left in 2019 to join Dulwich Hamlet. He started his career as a youngster at Stevenage Borough, going on to represent St Neots Town, Banbury, AFC Hornchurch and Chatham Town among others before a high-profile transfer to Dagenham & Redbridge in September 2014. After originally joining Invicta in 2017, he finished as their top goalscorer for 17-18 with 30 in all competitions, and again during 18-19 with 21. He returned an impressive 29 strikes last season; one of which came away at National League high-flyers Wrexham.

IN CHARGE: NEIL CUGLEY

Now in his 26th season as Invicta's manager, boss Neil Cugley has completed over 1,100 games in charge and became the longest-serving manager in the top seven tiers of English football when Arsene Wenger left Arsenal at the end of the 2017-18 season. He led the team to winning the Isthmian League Division One championship by 24 points in 2015-16 when he collected many personal accolades such as Manager of the Season and the Ray East Award. He also received a Lifetime Achievement award from The Non-League Paper at Chelsea's Stamford Bridge. Cugley has also managed Ashford Town, Folkestone Town and Hythe Town.

WE'VE MET BEFORE:

Enfield Town v Folkestone Invicta



Remarkably, this marks the third time in six seasons that we face Invicta on opening day...

Enfield Town's first game against Folkestone came back in September 2016 when we travelled to Kent and lost 0-2 at the height of a goal drought – Town's failure to score in this match taking the number of minutes since Harry Ottaway had scored their last goal against Kingstonian to 423: a grim statistic. 387 were there. How different it was when Folkestone came back to us for the April fixture. There was a buzz about the place as Town continued their push onwards to the play offs and 623 saw us keep the run going with a 3-1 win. Mark Kirby and Harry Ottaway put us 2-0 up by the break and Dernel Wynter soon added a third. Folkestone rallied to pull one back through Joe Taylor to give us a bit of a fright but the points were safe and the dream lived on.

Invicta visited us for the first game of 2017-18 and a new-look Towners side drew 1-1 in a stuttering performance. Drew Roberts gave us the lead after 46 minutes but they came back to level: Ade Yusuff netting the equalizer in a game which either side could have won. A very healthy 513 were there. The return game, in November, was a disaster as our awful away form continued. Simon Thomas gave us an early lead but then they rattled in five, including braces each for Yusuff and Johan Ter Horst. It could have been six, but Folkestone had a penalty saved by Joe Wright. 335 watched us slip to another away defeat.

Again we played Folkestone in the season opener in 2018-19 and again we boasted a new-look side. Invicta took the lead after 7 minutes through Keiron McCann but an own goal from Nat Blanks put us level. Ade Yusuff struck before the break and we went in 1-2 down. The game changed with the introduction of Brandon Adams after 70 minutes and his two goals gave us a 3-2 win. 449 were there. In the return game in February 2019 absolutely nothing happened for the first hour before Matt Johnson's looping header found the target. A late goal from Billy Bricknell ultimately gave us a comfortable 2-0 win in front of 382.

Folkestone came to us in November 2019 in a top of the table clash and Town could make a case for feeling hard done by the result. Ira Jackson had drilled into the near post for Invicta before Scott Heard's close-range header



made it 0-2 shortly after. After the restart, we pulled one back through Mo Faal but a 90th minute break away goal finished off by Heard sealed our fate as we went down 1-3 in front of 468. The return game in March 2020 was a terrific game that either side could have won. It ended in a 1-1 draw played out in front of 587. Billy Bricknell scored for us after only six minutes and Ira Jackson levelled for the hosts after 21.

Last season, Town journeyed to Kent in August 2021 and battled to preserve our unbeaten start to the season. An exciting game at Cheriton Road ended, somewhat controversially, in a 0-0 draw after David Smith's long-range effort was not adjudged to have crossed Nathan McDonald's goal-line. Adam Cunnington struck the post and both sides fashioned chances but couldn't break the deadlock in front of a very healthy crowd of 839. The sides' last meeting came here at Donkey Lane in December 2021, as Invicta ran out 3-2 winners in a high-stakes clash. Micheal Everitt scrambled in the opener after 15 minutes, following in Dave Smith's goalbound volley, before Town found a response within 90 seconds; Muhammadu Faal slotting home Lyle Della-Verde's through ball in trademark style. Invicta took advantage once more on the half-hour mark through Ade Yusuff's cool finish from Smith's slide-rule pass, and Smith would himself find the net in the second half, converting Alfie Paxman's square ball to put the game out of reach, in spite of Sam Youngs' late consolation for Town.

An empty gesture?

In a controversial move that seems certain to split public opinion, Premier League players have agreed to stop taking the knee routinely before kick-offs during the new season, instead performing it ahead of specific games, writes Andrew Warshaw.

Top-flight English clubs, as well as those across Europe, began the anti-racism gesture in order to support the Black Lives Matter movement, which rose to prominence following the case of George Floyd, a black man who died in May, 2020, at the hands of a white police officer in Minneapolis. The gesture has become standard procedure throughout the professional game and at some non-league grounds yet Premier League captains have now taken the decision to reduce taking the knee after consulting with their colleagues. You might have thought nothing had changed last weekend when players took the knee throughout the country but from now on, the gesture will only be seen before certain rounds of games, including the Boxing Day fixtures, Cup finals and dedicated “No Room for Racism” match rounds in October and March.

“We have decided to select significant moments to take the knee during the season to highlight our unity against all forms of racism and in so doing we continue to show solidarity for a common cause,” Premier League captains said in a statement. “We remain resolutely committed to eradicate racial prejudice, and to bring about an inclusive society with respect and equal opportunities for all.”

Some of you may remember how it all started. Taking the knee was originally inspired by NFL player Colin Kaepernick, who protested against racial oppression by kneeling during the US national anthem. This was after he was advised by a White ex-serviceman, Nate Boyer, a former Green Beret, that kneeling was a more respectful gesture than simply remaining in the changing room during the anthem. Kaepernick’s brave stance may have been criticised by then president Donald Trump but it prompted a wave of support from across world sport, not least football where it became de rigueur before games. In recent months, however, there have been several instances of fans booing their teams taking the knee. Not, one would like to think, in opposition to racial equality itself. More likely, possibly, revolving around the perception of it being a political gesture and supporters being lectured to.

So now we have reached the point, rightly or wrongly, where it is clear that players believe taking the knee has run its course and is in danger of becoming diluted. As a result, it will be used sparingly this season. Premier League chief

executive Richard Masters explained: “For two years now taking the knee has become part of the pre-match ritual. The players fear it is losing power and momentum and we will see it take place in a different format. It’s up to the players to decide themselves and we support them in whatever decision they make, as do the clubs.”

Some current and ex-footballers, including Wilfried Zaha and Les Ferdinand, point out that since players first started taking the knee, little meaningful progress has been made. For Zaha, it still “doesn’t matter whether we kneel or stand, some of us still continue to receive abuse”. Zaha has a point but so do those who are keen for the practise to continue. Crystal Palace manager Patrick Vieira said teams must carry on with the important ritual. “We can’t stop straight away because there are statements to make,” said Vieira. “It is important to keep taking the knee because we are all against discrimination. It will be a long fight and that’s why we still have to take the knee.”

He was supported by Leeds United’s American manager Jesse Marsch who said taking the knee was “absolutely the right thing”. “I love the fact that there’s been an appreciation of diversity in our sport which I think our sport is the most unique than any in the world,” said Marsch. “It’s not just racial, it’s international, it’s cultural, it’s religion. It’s everything.”

A CHAT WITH Marcus Wyllie

It's not too often, I express to our summer signing Marcus Wyllie, that someone comes in and endears themselves to a fanbase with their output and their energy quite this quickly - especially when pre-season hasn't necessarily been all plain sailing.

Yet, for those who have caught the forward's ebullient performances over the last month or so, it's hard not to have been at least somewhat impressed. "I always try my best for whoever I play for", he smiles. "So far so good, I'm enjoying playing with the boys and the style of play."

"It's been really good so far; everyone here is really welcoming. The whole setup is great and I'm really enjoying my time here so I'm glad I made the move."

Indeed, for all that we write about fans' favourites putting a shift in, and while it's always something of a gamble looking to recruit from Step 5, a pre-season return of five assists, a couple of goals, and plenty of hard yards in the tank suggests that there is substance behind the build-up. For Marcus himself, he's certainly looking forward to the challenge of getting stuck in regularly at this level:

And what he can do was certainly, obviously, on show last year - a return of 36 goals helped his Risborough Rangers side on their way to an incredible unbeaten run of 52 games, bettering even the 49 games of the famous Arsenal 'Invincibles' side of 2003-2004. His now former side described him as having 'the ability to score goals at will', and he certainly enjoyed his time last year, despite eventually missing out on promotion.



"We had a goal at the start of the season but for other reasons we were unable to go up at Risborough. Individually I set myself some goals and did what I wanted to do which was to have a really good season, score as many goals as possible, then hopefully get a good move up which is what has happened so I'm really happy."

Should he make his competitive debut for the Town this afternoon, Tottenham fan Marcus will certainly be looking to his first appearance at the QEII Stadium last month, as we entertained - and overcame - Spurs' Under-21s (who included a very familiar face in their lineup).

"Yeah it was unbelievable", he beams. "To get to play Tottenham here at the pitch for my first game was an exciting evening. I managed to get an assist and won a penalty which was great for me individually. We had the likes of Danny Rose playing, who I've been watching for so many years at Tottenham and just to play against them was a really big honour."

And, in his own words, what kind of player can we come to expect from him on an ideal day?

"I'm definitely someone who works really hard for the team; off the ball and on the ball. I like to take players on, I'd like to say I'm pretty fast - I like to get in behind, finish chances and score goals, as well as set some up."

Welcome again, and all the best Marcus - here's hoping that's the case this afternoon!

It's coming home...

FROM the very moment Leah Williamson proudly held aloft the Euro 2022 trophy for England in front of a packed-out Wembley crowd on Sunday, the 'L' word has captured the imagination of young people throughout the grassroots game.

The Lionesses' stole the hearts of a nation after their nerve-jangling 2-1 victory over Germany ended England's 56-year wait for a major trophy, watched by an estimated TV audience of 20 million. But it's another 'L' word, Legacy, which has taken the euphoria of victory to a whole new level and ignited interest in the women's game like never before.

Just hours after England's victory parade at London's Trafalgar Square last week, in front of thousands of joyous fans, new figures revealed unprecedented increases in young Brits looking to get involved. Analysis of Google search data revealed that searches for 'football lessons' exploded by 665% in the United Kingdom, while searches for 'Girl's football team' rose by 316.7%.

"The Lionesses' historic win has undoubtedly uplifted and inspired the nation, which is only further confirmed by these findings," said a spokesman for sports and fitness experts BarBend. "The sport, which is beloved by the British public, not only improves our technical capabilities but is also one of the most enjoyable sports to play, reliant on team bonding and communication. With support and admiration for the Lionesses appearing to not die down any time soon, it will be incredibly interesting to see if these figures translate into sign-ups for football lessons up and down the country."

With the growth of the women's game escalated to these new heights, all eyes will naturally be on local non-league clubs to help provide the platform for this new legacy to take hold. Undoubtedly, non-league football's most successful women's team is Lewes, whose first team currently play in the Women's Championship. The women's affiliate of the Isthmian League club, which prides itself on its 100% fan and community ownership, was established in 2002 and is growing by the year, thanks to their Elite Pathway schemes. Lewes hit the headlines nationally in 2017 when they became the first professional or semi-professional football club to pay its women's team the same as its men's team as part of their Equality FC initiative. To this day, they remain the only club to issue equal pay.

At the end of July, NLP told how National League club Bromley were leading the support for the Lionesses with their extensive community



programme. Including the youth section and academy, the Ravens have around 200 women and girls playing each week, starting from the 4-11 year olds Wildcats, the 12-16 year olds in The Squad, and the Bromley Belles, a fun recreational women's side which has seen a growth in participants from 12 to 50.

"I hope it has given people the taste and changed attitudes towards women playing football," said the club's a full-time women and girls' development officer, Andrea Ellis. "You've got to see it to believe it. Now we know young girls are seeing it. There are men wearing shirts with women's names on the back - Williamson on the back, or [Millie] Bright. That fills my heart with joy, it's amazing. "The Euros has ignited something. I'd like to think people will be actively seeking to get on the pitch. That has a knock-on effect - more women get involved, become coaches, more teams. It has a massive domino effect on the whole game." It's clear the 'L' word is the driving force behind a new community phenomenon about to sweep the nation. 'Love', 'Lionesses' or 'Legacy', take your pick, but one thing's for sure: it's provided the perfect fillip to start the 2022-23 season at all levels of the game - and non-league clubs can take full advantage.

This week in Town history...

A LOOK BACK AT ENCOUNTERS FROM THE PAST TWO DECADES



12th August 2002
Supporters Direct Cup
Enfield Town 2-3 AFC Wimbledon

This was the first edition of the Supporters Direct Cup - the tournament having been specially commissioned to recognise the fact that both participating clubs were new to non-league after being formed by disenchanted supporters. Hosted at Cheshunt's Theobald's Lane ground, the match attracted a very healthy crowd of over 500, and started at breakneck pace. In just the sixth minute, AFC broke down the left flank and Andy Sullivan's dangerous low cross was side-footed home by Joe Sheerin. Town began to recover and threatened to get back into the game, but the Dons were looking menacing on the break; Kevin Cooper's curling effort not far away from finding the top corner. Just shy of the half-hour mark, though, Cooper latched onto a ball through and volleyed it into the net from the edge of the Town box. Two down at half-time, Town did pull one back seven minutes after the restart, courtesy of Daniel Alleyne. Barely a minute later, however, Lee Sidwell burst through to slot home and restore the Dons' two-goal advantage. Town kept pressing and were rewarded in the 73rd minute when one of the many substitutes used by both sides, Martin St Hilaire, netted. We then piled on the pressure, winning a number of corners, but the visitors' back line held firm to secure a 3-2 victory - AFC Wimbledon's very first as a club ahead of their inaugural league season.

Brentwood Town 0-1 Enfield Town

Enfield Town claimed victory in their season opener thanks to a battling performance in Essex. Paul Marks got the only goal of an attritional game in which neither side created very many clear-cut opportunities. The Blues had been left reeling after the departure of ex-player, and manager, Carl Griffiths, but they were kept at bay thanks to a superb rear-guard display from the visiting Towners; Chris Wild and particularly David Allen making life difficult for Brentwood's forward line. A scrappy first half was punctuated by one good chance apiece for each side. Town went close when Wild's header off of Darrell Ellams' long throw looped over Brentwood goalie Nicky Pyne, but was cleared before anyone in a red and yellow shirt could apply a finishing touch. At the other end, the hosts spurned arguably their best chance of the match when Anthony Aylett broke through on goal, though Rob Blackburne stood tall to produce a fine save to deny the Blues forward while Town's defenders appealed for what looked like handball as Aylett controlled before shooting. Into the second half, Town struck what proved to be the winner when Marks produced a powerful header from a right-wing cross to beat Pyne in the Brentwood net.

-Dean, welcome to Enfield Town: how have you found your first few months with the club so far?

"I knew the club from playing against them and having some great battles so to become the manager of the ladies' first team was fantastic. I didn't realise how big the club was though with a pathway already in place with some fantastic young players and youth sides."

"Pre-season has gone really well. I have managed to keep nearly all the first team and added four really good signings, and I will be trying to get another couple in as then it completes us. Also, some of the youth players are already training with us as a first team which is fantastic to see."

-In terms of the game overall, just how important is it that focus is not only directed towards Women's Super League teams, but also to local and grassroots sides?

Enfield already has a pathway to the first team and this will only grow now after the Lionesses' success and we as a club need to push this on and go and get these talented young players from local schools, etc, and bring them into our club to make it stronger. I have been in the women's game nearly ten years now and watching the final made me proud to coach and manage in women's football."

BEHIND THE GOAL

Ahead of our season opener with Invicta, we cast our minds back to a goal against this afternoon's opponents on our run to the playoffs in 2016-17...

Enfield Town's Dernel Wynter enjoyed one of the most fruitful seasons of his career during that campaign, and played his part in our late-season sprint towards the Bostik Premier Division's playoff positions, netting ten times overall in the league to help the Towners into fourth spot. "I remember I was in and out of the team the first half of the season", he recalls. "When I began starting week in, week out


we went on a run that snuck us just into the playoffs. The best run of games I've been involved in."

One of those strikes came in a 3-1 win against today's opponents; his goal - the third and arguably best-crafted of the day - putting the game beyond doubt after Mark Kirby and Harry Ottaway had built up a two-goal advantage. In a slick passage of build-up play, Wynter and Ottaway exchanged some neat one-touch flicks near the halfway line before the former drove onwards towards goal and, taking advantage of Karl Oliyiide's dummy run, jinked outside to work a yard of space away from Invicta defender Liam Friend before sending a dipping, bouncing effort towards goal - which evaded the grasp of goalie Tim Roberts and found the bottom-left corner of the net. "The 1-2 between me and Harry set me off for a charge down the middle", he explained. "I was always thinking to get close enough to get a shot off and was buzzing

when it went in.

"I remember the great atmosphere there always is at Donkey Lane. My friend came to watch that match and I ran straight to him after scoring." These days, the forward is plying his trade at Hanwell Town, who he helped to promotion up to Step 3 last year - and before joining the Geordies he'd been part of a Harrow Borough side which reached the FA Cup First Round. "It's good to be back and doing what I do best", he says; though he still thinks fondly about his time at Town. "We always had a great changing room. Always had the belief we could beat anyone and that was from the staff to the players, even the fans."

As for his most memorable goal? "I would say my first goal against Met Police. I was 18, got subbed on around the 70th minute and scored a volley from a corner in the 88th minute - never forget it..."
